I have instructed the Police Department to enforce this ordinance better this summer, so if you have a question as to if you are violating the ordinance or if you know of a property that violates this ordinance please notify our Police Department at 801-825-1620. We are trying to keep our City clean by sweeping the streets and maintaining our City parks. We would appreciate anything you can do such as keeping your property maintained, picking up any garbage you might see on the sidewalks and in the gutters and maybe even gathering together with your neighbors to clean up a vacant home in your neighborhood.

Come visit us at the new Recycling Drop Off Center at the Davis Landfill in Layton. There is no charge to drop off recyclable items. Recycling reduces our impact on the environment by reducing the amount of natural resources we consume and extends the life of our landfill.

The center accepts:

- Cardboard
- All types of paper (including junk mail, magazines and phone books)
- Newspaper
- Plastic #1
- Plastic #2 (natural)
- Plastic #3 (colored)
- Aluminum
- Steel cans (food)
- Glass (NO brown)

Also located at the Recycling Drop Off Center is a Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Most items from your house and garage are accepted. Some exceptions are commercial hazardous waste, radioactive materials and bio hazardous waste.


The new facilities incorporate two solar panels and a windmill. The solar panels produce approximately 7,363 kilowatt hours of energy every year and the windmill produces approximately 4,440 kilowatt hours of energy each year (with a wind speed average of 12 mph). The facility is heated using methane collected from the landfill.

Fire Prevention Week October 3-9, 2010

This year's theme is: **Beep! Beep! Beep! Smoke Alarms: A sound you can live with.**

Facts About Fire---2008 in Review.

- U.S. fire departments responded to 386,500 home fires.
- Home fires killed 2,755 people and injured 13,160.
- Someone was injured in a reported home fire every 40 minutes.
- Roughly eight people died in home fires every day.
- A fire department responded to a home fire every 82 seconds.
- 83% of all fire deaths and 79% of fire injuries resulted from home fires.



Smoke Alarms save lives and should be in every home. Working smoke alarms cut the chances of dying in a fire in half. While almost all homes in the U.S. have at least one smoke alarm, roughly two-thirds of reported home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or with smoke alarms that don't work.

Alarm Types

- Typically an ionization smoke alarm is more responsive to flaming fires that spread rapidly.
- A photoelectric smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires that produce a lot of smoke.
- For best protection, install both types of alarms or a combination alarm.**
- Be sure all alarms have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.

From the Police Department

The Police Department is seeing an increase in violations of the following ordinances. Please be advised that these ordinances will be enforced.



Garbage Cans: Receptacles shall be placed in front of a residence for collection not earlier than the day before the scheduled day of collection and shall be removed therefrom within twenty-four (24) hours after collection.

Sidewalks: It is unlawful to allow the obstruction of sidewalks resulting in the restriction of pedestrian traffic by:

- Allowing the growth of weeds, shrubs, trees or overhanging limbs to protrude onto or over the sidewalk.
- Leaving any garbage (other than for pickup), other objects, structures, materials or vehicles on the sidewalk, in the road or in the right of way.

All Night Parking: No person shall park a vehicle on any street for a period of time longer than one hour between the hours of two o'clock (2:00) a.m. and seven o'clock (7:00) a.m. of any day. However, any resident of the City may request permission for all night parking when the same is required by emergency or other unusual circumstances. The Police Department, for good cause shown, may grant such permission. The Police Department shall be the sole judge as to the necessity and requirements for the granting of such permission.

Public Works



Tree Trimming – We would like to remind residents to keep their trees and bushes trimmed back so they don't obscure traffic signs and sidewalks. Limbs need to be 15 feet above the streets and 9 feet above sidewalks. Bushes need to be trimmed back one foot from the sidewalks.

Tree Limb & Yard Waste Disposal – This service is available at the Public Works maintenance shop yard and will be ending soon. The following rules apply:

- Available until October 15, 2010 by appointment only.
- Hours are Monday – Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. (call 801-825-1628 or 801-614-0014 for admittance)
Saturday 7:00 a.m. to noon (call 801-940-1206 for admittance)
Closed Sundays and Holidays
- Proof of Sunset City residency required.
- Items **NOT** accepted are oil, paint, chemicals, toxic materials, tires, batteries, computers, televisions and construction waste. For disposal of these items, contact Wasatch Integrated Waste Management, 801-614-5650.
- **NO commercial dumping allowed.**

Garbage Cans – Please do not place tree branches, televisions, fence posts, concrete, tires, rolls of carpet and other items of that nature into your garbage cans. This happens from time to time and the result can be that your can won't get emptied. If your can gets over filled, there is a good chance that some of the garbage may get spilled and maybe it's time to get a second can. Garbage pick up begins early in the morning, so it's best to have your can out the night before and away from parked cars.

Just a reminder – Normal trash pick up is on Wednesday.

Holiday schedule – Pick up will be one day later on any of the following holidays that fall on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday due to the landfill being closed: Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Years, Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day.

Snow Plowing – If we get any snow storms this year, we will plow it the same as previous years. First we will clear the Main roads. These include 800 North, 1300 North, 2000 North, 2300 North, 2400 North, 2575 North, 250 West and 475 West. You can usually find a clear path out of town before work and school starts. The roads within the subdivisions are next, followed by cul-de-sacs, dead ends, parking lots and sidewalks around our parks and buildings. When doing subdivisions, we usually make 2 to 3 passes down each side of the road. You may want to take note of this before you start shoveling out your driveway approach.



Air Tests Offered To Sunset Residents

Hill AFB plans to test the air in Sunset homes this fall and winter as part of its continuing indoor air sampling program. In September, information packets will be mailed to approximately 592 residents who live above the area of groundwater contamination in Sunset. These packets will include more detailed information about the indoor air sampling program and a postcard that residents can return if they wish to have their homes tested.

While not in the drinking water, chemicals found in the groundwater can evaporate and enter into homes. Over the past few years, Hill has tested the air in more than 1,800 homes, including 319 in Sunset. Approximately 34 percent of the homes tested in Sunset have been found to have very low levels of chemical vapors. At the levels typically found, the vapors do not pose a health risk to residents, but to ensure residents' safety, the Air Force will work with residents to monitor and, if levels are above health based standards, install a system in the home to keep vapors from entering. There is no cost to the resident for any of the actions taken as part of the air sampling program.

State of the Census Report from the Regional Director

The 2010 Census is on schedule and significantly under budget. The Census Bureau will return at least \$1.6 billion of our budgeted funds for the 2010 Census. This figure represents about 22% of the total amount allocated by Congress for the census in 2010.

In the 10-state Denver Region our local partners played a pivotal role in the success of the 2010 Census. When engaging with the public, trusted voices communicated key messages about the purpose of the Census, overcoming language barriers, distrust and apathy, to motivate all residents to fill out their Census questionnaires. Complete Count Committees (CCCs) in local communities contributed their resources and personnel toward achieving a successful count. Census workers from the community did a great job getting data from non-responding households. Local residents in this region fulfilled their civic duty by returning their questionnaires and cooperating with census workers.

Through our 2010 Census communications campaign, we conveyed the message that the simple act of completing and mailing back the form would result in large taxpayer savings. Since the American census is a true headcount, we must undertake the expensive process of sending census workers to follow up with every household that does not return their form. Fortunately, the American people heard us locally and nationally. They exceeded our estimates for the mail response rate of questionnaires, making the costs of the door-to-door phase much lower than anticipated – a total savings of \$650 million. In addition, the temporary census workers we hired here and around the country were spectacular. They worked more efficiently than we expected and made our field processes go smoothly.

To be fair, about \$800 million of savings was due to good fortune. The Census Bureau set aside this large contingency fund for emergencies such as hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, or a massive H1N1 flu pandemic – events that might have made it more difficult to hire qualified workers, or to gain the cooperation of the public. With most of the 2010 Census complete, we have sufficient resources to address any contingencies that remain.

I want to thank the residents in this region who fulfilled their civic duty by cooperating with the census. Their understanding of the importance of the census is thanks to the support of more than 15,000 Census Partners throughout the Denver Region working within their communities to raise awareness and encourage cooperation.

All residents and partners throughout the 10-state Denver Region, along with my colleagues at the Census Bureau, deserve hearty congratulations for achieving such outstanding cost efficiencies.
