Public Works

Neighborhood Dumpster Program - March 15 through Oct. 15

In addition to the automated garbage/recycling service, Sunset City offers its residents the Neighborhood Dumpster Program free of charge. Residents may request a dumpster (15 cu yard trailer) up to 2 times per year per household, depending on availability, for their neighborhood cleanup projects.

Residents may sign up for the dumpster at the City Offices located at 200 W. 1300 N. The dumpster is scheduled on a first come, first served basis so order yours today!

Delivery and Pick Up:

Drop off on the Monday requested and pick up on the following Thursday, or

Drop off on the Thursday requested and pick up on the following Monday.

RULES:

- **Dumpsters are for residential use only! No businesses, owners of rental properties or commercial contractors are to use this service.**
- Use of the dumpster is authorized by the responsible party.
- NO roofing or construction materials are allowed
- Toxic, hazardous or flammable materials (pesticides, herbicides, solvents, chemicals, paints, motor oil, gasoline, etc.), tires, batteries, televisions, computer monitors and computers may NOT be deposited in the dumpster. Information on disposal of household hazardous wastes may be obtained by calling Wasatch Integrated Waste Management at 801-614-5650.
- Dumpster should not be overloaded. If dirt and rock materials are deposited, the dumpster can only be filled one-third full. Never fill dumpsters above the sidewalls. Residents using the dumpsters will be required to clean up any spillage caused by overloading. If materials are deposited over the weight limit or on the ground, a fee may be assessed.

Fireworks Facts

Did you know that in a typical year, there are more fires on July 4th than any other day of the year? According to a National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) news release, fireworks account for more than 40% of those fires. A Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) news release said that 5,000 people went to ER between June 22nd and July 22nd last year.

About 200 people a day go to the ER with fireworks related injuries around the 4th (CPSC). The most common injuries are burns (54%) mostly to the hands and face. Most injuries were associated with malfunctioning fireworks or improper use (unexpected flight paths/debris and igniting or using fire-works too close to someone).

The highest rate of injuries nationwide is sparklers; they burn at 1200 degrees and that's hot enough to cause 3rd degree burns.

Fireworks Safety Tips:

- Always supervise children who are using sparklers and other fireworks
 - Explain the safety rules to children who are nearby or using fireworks
 - Make everyone wear shoes
 - Have a place for spent sparklers
 - Don't lean over fireworks when lighting them
 - Never relight or handle 'duds'
 - Read instructions on each device
 - Don't allow others to use fireworks if they are impaired
 - Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
