HAFB - I continue to serve as the "Honorary Commander" for the 388 Fighter Wing at HAFB with Colonel Todd Murphy and Colonel Jason Roushcoff. As you know the F-35 fighter jets are replacing the F-16 fighter jets. They are remarkable planes. This interface from our community is an effort to support our Service men and women as a community. I continually let them know how vital their service is. I attended Colonel Brad Lyon's retirement. He is moving on to Washington D.C. and he will take with him the support of Sunset City. Freedom is not free — enjoy the sounds of freedom.



PUBLIC WORKS - The Public Works employees have been in full swing to get our parks and grounds in tip top condition. I hope you are all enjoying the City around you. I want to remind you of some things that have been installed for your convenience. First, the Pickle Ball Court at the Rachael Runyan Memorial Park (I hate to advertise as I would like the court all to myself:) Pickle Ball is for the entire family and is a game much like table tennis on a court. It is addicting and there are many tournaments throughout the State. It will get your family together for a fun opportunity to play outside. Second, our restrooms are open and ready for use. They are beautiful and a long awaited welcome to our community. The Central Park restroom will have a Pergola (shelter) so that residents have additional shade. I thank our Public Works Department for erecting it. It should be ready in time for Sunset City Fun Days. Third, our new Marquee is up and running so we again have this means of getting information out to the public.

ADMINISTRATION - We have a new credit card processing company and with that the processing fee has been lowered from 5% to 2.45% with a minimum of \$1.95.

RECOGNITION - I would like to thank Sunset City resident Sandra Bybee and her Committee for an awesome event recognizing and honoring our Police and Fire Departments. (I was out of town and unable to attend). It was seriously a wonderful tribute not only for our Fire and Police Departments, but also for our community to come together as "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" to honor them and their families for their sacrifices for our City. This took a lot of coordination with our business partners, community, and City Staff to pull off such a nice event. Please let them know that you appreciate their efforts.



KIWANIS CLUB - You may have noticed the beautiful American flags that have been put up around the Administration building for our National Holidays. I would like to thank the Kiwanis Club for donating the flags and to our Public Works Department for putting them up. What a nice addition to our community. As Mayor, and also as President of the North Davis Kiwanis Club, I presented the Hope of America Awards at several schools to recognize our future leaders.

A NOTE OF INFORMATION - Weber Basin Water's test of the City's well water came out good so they will start to build a new well house in the fall. Wasatch Integrated has purchased Bay View Landfill in Springville, Utah. It is not easy to find enough land to put our refuse. It is important that residents understand that our Landfill has a life span of approximately twenty years, although we hope it's longer. When we have to begin transferring refuse to Springville the cost of our refuse collection will go up.

BUDGET - Our budget has been a big issue. With an aging community there are ongoing water leaks and road repair issues and they have taken a toll on our budget. 2300 North got its much needed repair last year, 1300 North will be done this summer and 800 North will be done next year. The new roads will be nicer to our vehicles, but it has taken its toll on the City budget.

FIRE DEPARTMENT - I want to personally thank the Sunset Fire Department for their years of service. I understand the history that has gone along with this service and many residents have been volunteers with the Department and many residents have benefited from their service.

The Council and I have heard from many residents, both pro and con, on the fire and ambulance service annexation issue. There are some residents who have volunteered to pay higher taxes to keep the Fire Department in our City no matter how high it goes. The cost of providing this service is going up. In addressing personnel, the cost of doing business and the cost of a new fire station, it has been determined that the residents would benefit by having the North Davis Fire District provide those services in Sunset. The City Council approved, and I have signed, an Interlocal Agreement with North Davis Fire District to provide our fire and ambulance services until December 31, 2017. During this time we will be working on an application to annex our fire and ambulance services to the North Davis Fire District. We will then share the cost of the service with Clearfield and West Point. Interlocal agreements are still in place with Clinton and Roy as backup fire protection service, as has always been the case.

The Sunset Fire Department and the North Davis Fire District have worked to make this as smooth a transition as possible. I commend them and thank both the Department and District. North Davis Fire District has assured me that our residents will be taken care of in a timely and efficient manner. Please be aware that they have been asked for their service and they are willing to be part of our community. Please let them know that as "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" our community will welcome them and treat them with respect.

Please be assured that as the Mayor I work for all of the citizens of our city. It has not been an easy task, but I love this City and will continue to look out for the best interests of all residents. I appreciate and thank you for your continued support.

Welcome Sunset residents to the North Davis Fire District (NDFD)

On July 1st 2017, Sunset City officially became a member community of NDFD. We are excited to serve the wonderful citizens and businesses of Sunset. Throughout the past few months we have heard some common questions about how this transition will affect the citizens of Sunset and we would like to address some of these questions.

1. Is Sunset losing their fire department?
 - a. No, Sunset is now part of a fire district with 2 stations, 2 ladder trucks, 2 engines, 2 brush trucks, 5 ambulances, 2 full time chief officers, 24 full time firefighters and 20 part time firefighters. Sunset City has all of these resources available to respond in the event of an emergency. Additionally there will be resources responding to fires in Sunset from Roy, Clinton, Syracuse and Layton on the initial alarm. Additional units can be called from HAFB, Weber Fire District, Kaysville, South Weber and Riverdale. The citizens of Sunset are very well protected. Our fire prevention division will be conducting fire safety assessments in all commercial businesses as well as plan reviews for new construction. NDFD employs a full time fire marshal to address all fire code and compliance issues.
2. Will my insurance rates go up because of the transition to NDFD?
 - a. No. Insurance companies use a rating system called ISO to determine fire insurance rates. Prior to July 1, 2017 Sunset City had an ISO rating of 4. NDFD has the same rating of 4 so rates should stay the same.
3. How will NDFD be able to handle the increased call volume from the addition of Sunset?
 - a. NDFD has increased staffing from 4 to 6 firefighters as well as added an additional engine and ambulance to station 42 (Clearfield) that will primarily respond to Sunset.
4. Will Sunset City residents lose the community involvement from the fire department?
 - a. No. NDFD is excited and proud to be a part of such a great community. We are excited to be involved with Fun Days, car shows, Easter Egg hunts, community gatherings as well as we have already been in contact with the North Pole and are excited to drive Santa Claus around town this coming December! Our Public Education Team will be involved in the elementary schools doing fire safety assemblies. We will be available to teach Boy Scouts, church groups and anyone else wanting first aid and fire safety demonstrations. On October 9th we will be hosting a Fire Prevention Open House with fire engine rides, fire safety demonstrations and much, much more!
5. Will Sunset residents have representation on the NDFD control board?
 - a. Yes. Sunset city will provide 2 elected officials to be part of the administrative control board where they will help in making decisions pertaining to the district and the communities that it serves.

We are excited to be part of Sunset and for Sunset to be part of NDFD! If you have any questions about the district please let us know. We want to help Sunset continue to be the great hometown community that it is known for!

Sunset City Water Quality Report 2016

We are pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. The water we drink in Sunset is purchased from the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District

Sunset City has a Drinking Water Source Protection Plan that is available for review to our customers at our city offices. It provides more information such as potential sources of contamination and our source protection areas. Our Sources have a low level of susceptibility from potential contamination from sources such as roads and residential areas.

We are pleased to report that our water is safe and meets federal and state requirements. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact the Sunset City Public Works office at 801-614-9105. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you would like to attend any of our regularly scheduled City Council meetings, they are held on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, 6:30 p.m., at the Sunset City offices, 200 West 1300 North, Sunset, Utah.

Sunset City routinely monitors for contaminants in our drinking water in accordance with the Federal and State laws. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2016. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily pose a health risk.

In the following tables you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Detected Contaminant – Any contaminant detected at or above its minimum detection limit (MDL).

Minimum Detection Limit – The lowest level at which a particular contaminant is detected with a specific degree of certainty.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) – The “Maximum Allowed” (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminate Level Goal (MCLG) – The “goal” (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Not Applicable (NA) – there is no Federal or State MCL and or MCLG

NTU – Nephelometric Turbidity Unit – a measure of the cloudiness of the water.

Non-Detects (ND) – laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years, or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/l) – one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) – Picocuries per liter is a measure of radioactivity in water.

Sunset City purchases 100% of its water from the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District whose primary source of water comes from the Weber River Basin. The District has divided their culinary water supply into three separate distribution systems. These systems are Weber Basin NORTH, Weber Basin CENTRAL, and Weber Basin SOUTH. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Sunset City is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by constituents that are naturally occurring or man-made. Those constituents can be microbes, organic or inorganic chemicals, or radioactive materials. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Water Quality Inside Your Home

Sunset City delivers water that is cleaner than required by state and federal law. However, once water passes from our system and through the meter, you become a partner with us in making sure it stays that way. Here are some things to consider.

Water Heaters

Check the temperature setting for your water heater. Water that is too hot can create a burn hazard, while water that is too cool can create a perfect environment for bacteria to grow. You may also want to consider installing a pressure regulator to prevent any sudden surges to your water heater.

Filters and Purifiers

All types of filters and purifiers need to be properly maintained and monitored. Neglected devices may not work as intended. They can become a haven for microbial growth, or shed filter material into your home's tap water. Even the filter in your refrigerator needs to be maintained to protect your family.

Water Softeners

Since the hardness of your water can range anywhere from 1 to 12 grains per gallon, it is important to monitor the settings on your water softener regularly to make sure that you are treating your water properly. Over treating your water is wasted money, while under treating is not effective.

Unused Rooms

If you have a kitchen or bathroom that rarely gets used, you should make a point of running water through the faucets on a frequent basis. Stagnant pipes and fixtures are susceptible to microbial growth. Flushing unused water lines regularly will help prevent this.

Lawn Care

Make sure you have an approved backflow device on your sprinkling system. Remember anything you hook to the drinking water to help maintain beautiful landscaping has the potential to backflow into your drinking water. Please be careful when using chemicals that hook to a garden hose.
